# **Nursing Home Transition Success Story 2021**

Clifton Davison is a 60-year-old man with diabetes, heart failure and recently had his leg amputated below the knee due to a diabetic ulcer that wouldn't heal. When his wife called Ability 1st, he was receiving treatment at the Specialty Hospital and was needing to move to a Nursing and Rehabilitation facility to continue his care and rehabilitation. He was planning on returning home after his rehabilitation was complete but would need assistance with accessing assistive technology to assist in making his two-story town home accessible to him. He needed a bariatric manual wheel chair, transfer bench, and bedside commode, a transfer board, a hand-held shower, ramps and a stair lift in order for him to be able to care for his personal care needs independently in his home and to be able to access his home.

I completed loan bank and assistive technology referrals and emailed them to the Loan Bank and Assistive Technology coordinators. The hand-held shower, bariatric transfer bench, bedside commode and manual wheelchair were delivered to his home. An assistive technology evaluation was conducted and found that since Clifton and his wife are currently renting that in order for a stair lift to be placed, they needed to understand that if they ever move, they would be responsible for moving it and it was also found that there was no feasible way for an ADA code ramp to be placed at the home due to the architecture of it so it was recommended by the Assistive Technology coordinator that they find another organization to construct a ramp because when Ability 1<sup>st</sup> and the Utah Assistive Technology put in a ramp, it has to be up to ADA code.

In the meantime, Clifton also requested a super pole and lift chair to assist him with being able to get up and down out of a seated position. I packet was put on to the State for authorization of funding for the stair lift and for the lift chair. I had to advocate with the Utah State Office of Rehabilitation in Clifton's behalf because he needed the stair lift and lift chair to be in place when he transitioned back to his home from the Nursing and Rehab facility. After explaining the situation to USOR, they moved Clifton to the front of the list and the equipment was funded and the stair lift was installed by the time Clifton was released to go home. He had to wait on the lift chair because the vendor was behind due to Covid.



## **Community Transition Success Story 2021**

Lucia has been always a driven person. Originally from Mexico. Her and her past husband made the decision to come to the USA and seek new opportunities. After her husband passed away she encountered drastic uncertainty and many mentally and emotional abusive environments. Her son evicted her from their house and she ended on the street.

Her boyfriend picked her up and took her to his house where she lives there for a few months. She was living in a roach-infested house, barely able to afford to share the bills. He boyfriend had turned off the heater during the day because he said that she spent too much electricity. When she had been getting beaten by her ex-boyfriend and had not else to turn to. She was able to address to me her painful situations that had affected her life as a child. Lucia came to Ability1st for advice and ask to work. During one of many phone calls, and filling papers, finally she was able to apply and work for Easter Seal; She continues working with Easter Seal and very happy until her friend told her that she needed to move out within two weeks because he had sold the house.

Then, her struggles and anxiety started again I also assisted her to apply for Provo Housing and advocated on her behalf, and because she was victim of domestic violence, Provo Housing placed her on the top of the list and finally, she got the apartment and she is able to have the security and stability that she had been seeking, and allowed her to feel safe and be independent.



The work of independent living is very satisfying most of the time. However, when I lose one of my consumers I always look back and ask myself "did I do enough for John; what more could I have done?" When I got the call from John's mother last Monday that John had died I felt a mixture of regret, sadness and joy. The regret was something I always feel, the sadness that I would no longer be able to see John, but the joy was the imagine that came to my mind when I heard he died. The image of John finally be able to speak, run, jump. I could see him sprinting from his wheelchair and never looking

His mother thanked me and Ability 1<sup>st</sup> Utah for all the help that their family received during his 17 short years of life. John's was never able to receive services from Utah various Medicaid Waiver Programs. He was still on the waiting list at the time of his death.

John needed a bathroom redo so he could bathe, toilet and take care of hygiene in the family home. We helped the family get the assistive technology that allowed John to be fully integrated into family life; ways to get upstairs and downstairs, special eating utensils, and last but certainly not least use of apps and devices that helped John lose himself in the books he came to love listening to.

The family home was the place where John felt safe, loved and could be entirely himself. Our team, two prior coordinators before I got to know John, built a relationship with John and his family. We were all committed to keeping this young man with his family. Helping them to overcome barriers that at the time seemed impossible to bridge. John's story is a true success story even though he's not here with us any longer. I will miss him.
